Catalan Literature is showcased at the London Book Fair 2022 with the programme **Spotlight**. **Books in Catalan**. With a series of 8 panel events, it will feature a selection of some of the finest Catalan authors such as Irene Solà, Sergi Pàmies, Eva Baltasar, Aina Bestard, Raül Garrigasait, Borja Bagunyà, Marta Orriols and Josep Maria Esquirol.

Each conversation pairs one Catalan author with a UK peer, including award-winning authors and translators such as Max Porter, Jay Griffiths, Daisy Johnson, David Constantine, Yara Rodrigues Fowler, Vassiliki Tzomaka, Peter Bush, Rupert Thomson and renowned publisher Christopher MacLehose.

These events will be chaired by the editor of Monocle 24 Books and host of Meet the Writers, Georgina Godwin; Founder and Director of the European Literature Network, Rosie Goldsmith; and award-winning writer, editor and translator, Daniel Hahn.

The programme will offer a rich overview of Catalan writing including Modern Classics, Contemporary Fiction, Literary Non-Fiction, and Children's books. It will also exhibit the work of eight illustrators, a representative selection of the prominent illustration scene in Catalonia and the Balearic Islands.

Along with these events, **Spotlight. Books in Catalan** includes a matchmaking programme to foster professional relationships between Catalan and English-speaking publishers and agents.

The Spotlight programme is the culmination of many years of successful trade and cultural cooperation between Catalan and British publishing professionals as well as the confirmation of an enriching literary exchange.

Author, translator and expert in Catalan literature **Raül Garrigasait**, whose latest novel *Els estranys* (*The Others*), winner of the Catalan Bookseller's Prize, has been recently published in English by Fum d'Estampa, will be in a panel discussion with prestigious publisher **Christopher MacLehose**, to talk about the importance of classics in publishing, the essential role that translation plays in bringing cultures together, as well as the translation of Catalan Modern Classics into English as a contribution to this shared literary tradition. #### LONDON BOOK FAIR OLYMPIA THEATRE



Raül Garrigasait, Solsona, 1979 is a writer and a classicist. In his non-fiction he has explored such themes as cosmopolitanism (El gos cosmopolita i dos espècimens més [The Cosmopolitan Dog and Two Other Specimens]), the beginnings of modernity in Catalonia (El fugitiu que no se'n va [The Fugitive Who Won't Leave]) and the relationship between Greco-Roman classics and power (Els fundadors [The Founders]). His novel Els estranys (The Others, Fum d'Estampa 2017) won the Catalan Bookseller's Prize, the Òmnium Award for Best Catalan Novel, and the Setè Cel Prize.



Christopher MacLehose is the founder of Mountain Leopard Press. He previously established MacLehose Press, where he was publisher from 2008 to 2020, and Harvill Press, where he was publisher from 1984 to 2003. He is committed to publishing literature in translation to the highest standard and has published literature and crime fiction in translation from more than thirty-five languages, and prize-winning writers from many cultures. He was awarded the London Book Fair Lifetime Achievement Award in 2006.



Rosie Goldsmith is director and founder of the European Literature Network and Editor-in-Chief of The Riveter magazine. She was a BBC broadcaster for 20 years and is today an arts journalist and presenter. Rosie is a passionate linguist (French, German and Italian) and traveller and has lived in Europe, Africa and the USA. She was chair of the judges for the EBRD Literature Prize 2018–2020. Known as a champion of international literature, translation and language learning, she promotes them whenever she can.

# Across Language and Time: Translating Classics

Sometimes words travel not only across cultures and languages, but across time as well. This is the case of translating classics – books written decades or even centuries ago. The timeless ones, despite being from a different era, bring us stories and characters that can still be relevant and exciting.

For this reason, there are translators and publishers willing to take on the special challenge of translating and publishing them. What is their approach? What are they looking for in older literature? How is the process different from working with contemporary literary works? Last but not least, do less popular languages have a chance for their William Shakespeare or Jane Austen – read outside a narrow circle of academics? Answers to these questions will be sought by speakers of this discussion panel, co-organised by the **Polish Book Institute** and the **Institut Ramon Llull.**

Peter Bush has translated a number of classics: from Spanish, Fernando de Roja's *Celestina*; from Catalan, Mercè Rodoreda's In Diamond Square (Virago, 2013), Joan Sales' Uncertain Glory and Winds in the Night (The MacLehose Press), Josep Pla's The Gray Notebook (NYRB, 2013) and Pla's short story collections Life Embitters and Salt Water (Archipelago Books, 2015 and 2020), and Rosa Maria Arquimbau's Forty Lost Years (Fum d'Estampa, 2021). He is now working on Proust's The Guermantes Way (OUP) and Balzac's The Lily in the Valley (NYRB). A Film (3000 meters) by Víctor Català has just been published by Open Letter.

**Borja Bagunyà** is one of the most outstanding authors from the new generation of Catalan writers. He holds a degree in literary theory and comparative literature, and his three published works have met with great praise from critics. When he was just 24 years old, his book of short stories *Defensa pròpia* won the Mercè Rodoreda Award and the QWERTY Award. Since 20II, he has taught literary theory at the University of Barcelona, and he is co-founder of the Bloom Literature School, also in Barcelona.



Rupert Thomson was born in Eastbourne, East Sussex and studied Medieval History and Political Thought at the University of Cambridge. His highly acclaimed works include novels Secrecy, The Five Gates of Hell, Death of a Murderer, The Book of Revelation, Soft!, and The Insult, and a memoir, This Party's Got to Stop. In 2015, Thomson was named a fellow of the Royal Society of Literature. His book Barcelona Dreaming (Other Press, 2021) was awarded The Irish Times: Best Book of the Year; New York Times Book Review: Editor's Choice; The Times (UK): Book of the Week Pick; Foreword Reviews: Book of the Day Pick; Conde Nast Traveler: Best Book of the Season Pick.

Irene Solà holds a degree in Fine Arts from the University of Barcelona and a Master's in Literature, Cinema and Visual Culture from the University of Sussex. Her work has been exhibited at the Whitechapel Gallery (London) and the CCCB (Barcelona), among others. When I Sing, Mountains Dance (Granta, 2022) is the winner of the prestigious 2019 Anagrama Catalan Novel Award.



**Daisy Johnson**'s debut short-story collection, *Fen*, was published in 2016 and won the Edge Hill Prize. His previous literary awards include the 2007 City of Barcelona Prize and the eighth volume of stories, L'art de portar gavardina (The Art of Wearing a Trench Coat, Other Press 2021) has already earned him both the 2019 Catalan Critics' Prize and the 2019 Serra d'Or.



David Constantine has published a dozen volumes of poetry (most recently – 2020 – Belongings); also two novels and six collections of short stories, the most recent of these being The Dressing-up Box, (2019). 

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
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
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
